

Co-operative Development Steering Group

Minutes of meeting held on Friday 11th February/

- 1. Meeting with STUC: all agreed that it had been a most helpful meeting. George undertook to write thanking them for their time and support.
- 2. Relationship with ICOM: John read out a minute of the ICOM Executive which: 'fully supported (the Scottish) initiative insofar that, for practical purposes, it forms part of a national common-ownership movement' and reported that ICOM had nominiated Alastair Campbell as their representative on the proposed Development Committee. John also reported that the new ICOM model rules would be available in about three weeks.
- 3. Grant aid under the ICO Act: John also reported from the ICOF Trustees meeting that it was now likely that the Department of Industry would itself decide on the allocation of the £30,000 for advice. This was confirmed by Roger following a meeting between Willy Roe (SCSS) and Mr Hollocks, a civil servant at the DI concerned with the ICO Act. Mr Hollocks had suggested that we might apply for recognition as an advisory body and had asked whether we had plans to set up a seperate Scottish loan fund.

It was agreed to invite Mr H to the meeting on 25 February and to a pre-meeting with the Steering Group. It was also agreed to explain to him that we would like the proposed Development Committee to become a recognised advisory body and to ask how the Committee should formally apply once it has been formed on 25 February. It was further agreed to inform Mr H that we had no plans to set up a Scottish loan fund, preferring to make use of the ICOF machinery; although this would not preclude the possibility of raising funds in Scotland which could be ear-marked for Scottish enterprises. Roger undertook to maintain liaison with Mr Hollocks.

- 4. Relationship with ICOF: it was noted that the new Development Committee would need to discuss with ICOF the arrangements for assessing schemes in Scotland which might apply to ICOF for loans under the Act.
- 5. Meeting on 25 February: It was confirmed that Geaorge would chair the meeting; Roger would present the main report on the work of the Steering Committee and the proposals; John would talk briefly about the ICO Act and Alison would present the

SCOTTISH CO-OPERATIVES STEERING GROUP

FEBRUARY 1977

THE DEVELOPMENT OF PRODUCER CO-OPERATIVE AND COMMON OWNERSHIP ENTERPRISES IN SCOTLAND

A OBJECTIVES

To foster the growth of workers' co-operative enterprises in Scotland in the belief that for workers to own, to control and to shape the organisations in which they work is

- a) a means by which they can more certainly exert an influence over their economic situation, replacing exploitation and conflict by co-operation.
- b) an extension of the democratic process, by making industry accountable to its workers and sensitive to the wider community.
- c) a means by which workers can grow as persons, developing their own abilities for the common good.

B PROPOSALS

That a Co-operative Development Committee be formed for Scotland, representative of the various agencies interested in the development of workers' co-operative enterprises.

That the Development Committee carry out advisory and other work in Scotland as defined under the Industrial Common Ownership Act, 1976.

That the Development Committee employ two Development Workers to assist its objectives.

That financial support be sought from Industrial Common Ownership Finance Ltd as the "designated body" under the Act, and from trust funds.

That a Co-operative Forum also be formed, meeting once or twice a year, which would constitute a basis for wider discussions, and would provide advice and a sounding-board for the Development Committee.

C BACKGROUND

In spring 1976 the Co-operative Union, the Scottish Council of Social Service and the Workers Educational Association formed a steering group to consider ways of promoting public discussion about producer co-operatives. They were concerned to encourage a "community development approach" to economic issues. A seminar was planned for October 1976 and in the introduction to the programme the steering group stated that "through their ability to organise collective action at local level, community workers and community groups have a great deal to contribute to economic development. By placing emphasis on the pooled resources and initiative of local people, co-operatives offer an appropriate means of creating alternative kinds of employment to private or state-owned enterprises".

The objectives of the seminar were defined as:

- i) to share experiences of locally-based producer co-operatives
- ii) to stimulate thinking about co-operatives as part of the community development process in Vernaua
- iii) to examine the resources required to promote the further development of co-operatives.

ICOM

Edinburgh Books Collective attended the Annual General Meeting of the Industrial Common Ownership Movement (I.C.O.M.) in Sheffield on 12 & 13 July 1978. Like most, we are Associate Members of the Movement. It was well worth while to meet other co-operatives and to learn of progress in different parts of the country (and in Mondragon). Cryer MP (a Minister of State at the Dept. of Trade and Industry) spoke about the fresh-on-the-Statute Book Co-operative Development Agency Act 1978. We elected a slightly more radical I.C.O.M. Council 1978-79, including two members from Scottish Collectives.

ON THE MOVE AGAIN?

Since the last Newsletter we have agreed, as a long-term committment, to create full-time employment within the Bookshop. We plan to do this after we find and move into "High Street"-type premises. And here's the rub: we could simply move out of Niddry Street into larger more accessible premises, or we could work with other groups to try to take out a shared let on a fairly large building.

We're looking at the possibility of sharing a lease and we have written to the Director of Estates, City of Edinburgh District Council, asking the Department to clarify the City's policy on 36-42 Nicolson Street, the vacant, excellently situated Alexander's Stores. The building was blighted until recently by a Ring Road proposal, but this has been dropped completely.


What we have in mind is a Wholefood Restaurant/Bookshop Exhibition Centre plus meeting rooms/workshops above, with maybe residential use on the top floor for the people who will be employed in the building. Informal soundings with the South Side Association indicate a welcome for these uses. The whole scheme would be a very fine "advertisement" for the new co-operative movement in the City.

The whole project is up for discussion. There is time in hand. Please can we hear from other groups and individuals in Edinburgh?

FAB

FAB is the Federation of Alternative Bookshops in the UK. Its been going for several years but has recently seen a great burst of life as the growing number of alternative/left bookshops feel the need to meet and share information. And no doubt the success of PDC (Publications Distribution Co-operative) has stimulated FAB. FAB publishes a regular Newsletter (Address: Mandy, News from Nowhere, 100 Whitechapel, LIVERPOOL). During July, there was heated discussion about whether or not FAB should employ a full-time worker. The recent meeting of Bookshops in Leamington Spa at The Other Branch on 30 July was poorly attended. Most people are against the proposal, but the whole issue will be fully discussed at the next FAB Meeting in




